

How to report online child sexual exploitation

There are a range of organisations that each have a role to play in protecting children from online child sexual exploitation. Each organisation covers a specific area of focus, with the overall aim of protecting people online.

Investigate and Identify Child Sexual Offenders



The New Zealand Police has a specialist team that protects children from online abuse, identifies, investigates and prosecutes offenders involved in online child exploitation.

You can report incidents of child exploitation to the NZ Police at [105.police.govt.nz](https://www.police.govt.nz), by calling 105, or in an emergency, 111.

Investigates reports of child sexual abuse material



DIA enforces the Films, Videos, and Publications Classifications Act 1993 by investigating the manufacture, possession and trade of child sexual abuse material online and prosecuting people who collect and distribute it online.

Investigates cross-border child sexual exploitation



Customs targets the import or export of child sexual abuse material across our physical and cyber borders to identify, investigate and prosecute individuals.

Categorises objectionable material



The Classification Office is responsible for making decisions under the Films, Videos, and Publications Classification Act 1993 and determines whether material should be classified as objectionable (Banned).
